Birmingham, Alabama, is the site of the Federation of Genealogical Societies 2012 annual conference for the nation’s genealogists. Genealogists will have the opportunity to experience both an incredible conference and superb research facilities near the venue.

Genealogists and those interested in learning more about their family history from across the nation are all welcome. You do not need to be a member of a genealogical society to attend the conference and enjoy this rich learning experience.

Alabama Genealogical Society

Our local host, the Alabama Genealogical Society (algensoc.org), was chartered in 1958 and serves all sixty-seven Alabama counties. It is dedicated to preserving the history and heritage of families in Alabama. The society is proud of its multi-award-winning *AGS Magazine* that spotlights relevant genealogical information statewide. AGS past-president, Elizabeth Wells, and current first vice-president, Yvonne Crumpler, are serving as the local conference co-chairs. They will work with David E. Rencher, national conference chair to create an outstanding genealogical conference experience.

Birmingham, Alabama

Birmingham is a late addition to the cities of the Old South—founded in 1871, the genesis of its founding interestingly enough was the intersection of two major railroads. It was an industrial center with plenty of natural resources readily available—primarily coal, iron ore, and limestone. With these resources in abundance, the area grew rapidly. During the Great Depression, residents suffered much with the downturn in the economy. However, Birmingham bounced back after World War II and has been moving forward ever since.

Centrally located in northern Alabama, Birmingham is easy to get to by any mode of transportation—something that wasn’t as easy for the early settlers of the “Old Southwest.”

- **Planes:** Birmingham-Shuttlesworth International Airport (www.bhamintlairport.com/) is Alabama’s largest airport and serves the greater Birmingham area. It is served by many of the nation’s major airlines including America West, American, Continental, Delta, Southwest, United Express, and US Airways.
- **Trains:** Birmingham is on the Amtrak line that runs from New York to New Orleans. The Amtrak station in Birmingham is located just blocks away from the Sheraton Hotel and the Birmingham

Convention Center (1.1 miles).

- **Automobiles:** If you plan to travel by car, Interstates 59 and 20 intersect Interstate 65 in Birmingham. As a crossroads, Birmingham is located 140 miles from Atlanta, Georgia; 214 miles from Jackson, Mississippi; 236 miles from Knoxville, Tennessee; and 206 miles from Mobile, Alabama.

The Conference
